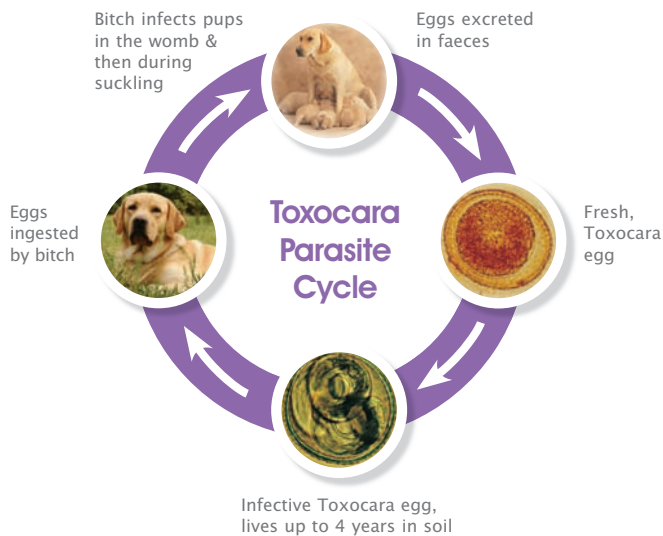

It is even more important to worm pregnant bitches. All bitches are infected with worm larvae. These lie hidden and dormant within the body of the bitch and become active during pregnancy, infecting the pups whilst still in the womb. And once the puppies are born, further worm infection comes from the milk when suckling.

So, pregnant bitches need to be wormed from day 40 of the pregnancy, *every day* until 2 days post whelping. After this, they should be wormed at the same time as the puppies. (See section on puppies)

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Pregnant bitches need frequent worming to help reduce infection in the puppies



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Have you ever bitten into an apple and found a worm inside?



Because it looked nice on the outside you probably thought it was okay, so it must have been a nasty shock to find a worm hidden on the inside. Well, it's not much different with your pets. They may look healthy on the outside, but on the inside they may have worms too.

Unfortunately, these worms are much worse than the ones you find in apples and they come in many different disguises - roundworms, whipworms, tapeworms and hookworms are only a few of the parasites that can affect your dog. If left untreated, they can seriously harm your dog's health and cause problems such as diarrhoea, vomiting, weight loss and anaemia.

But the problem doesn't just end there - some worms (Toxocara) can be transmitted to humans. Children are especially vulnerable.

Worm eggs are passed in the faeces of an infected dog and can be spread and picked up by other animals or children when they play in parks or gardens. And it's not just a single worm like in your apple - every day these parasites could be shedding thousands of eggs. Not only are they invisible to the naked eye, but because they can survive in the soil for up to 4 years it's very hard to tell when your children are at risk.

It is recommended that adult dogs are wormed at least every 3 months and Panacur comes in a variety of formulations to help you do this. (see chart on back cover)

Designed to be just like treats, they're such an easy way to worm your dog that even the fussiest of dogs will enjoy them!



It's important to worm your dog at least every 3 months.

If you have a puppy, you'll want to give it the best start in life so it's important to make sure it's wormed regularly.

Panacur Paste

Puppies need to be wormed more frequently than adult dogs.

Panacur Paste is an ideal choice:

- **Easy to administer** - simply squeeze the required dose into your puppy's mouth.
- **Accurate dosing** - As it is a paste rather than a tablet, it is simple to give the exact dose that your puppy requires.

Puppies should be wormed when they are 2, 5, 8 and 12 weeks of age and then every month after that until they are 6 months old. After 6 months, they should be treated as an adult dog and wormed every 3 months.



Puppies should be wormed more regularly than adult dogs until they are 6 months of age.
